Some Interesting Data About U of M Seniors

Responses to Diversity Issues & General Student Experiences

92% agreed that they had gained "A broad, intellectually exciting education" over their four years at Michigan. 82% agreed that, "Increasing the racial/ethnic diversity of the student body makes a positive contribution to the education of <u>all</u> students".

85% support, "Incorporating writings and research about different ethnic groups and women" as essential elements in a college's core curriculum.

Other interesting information...

- 31% reported having been involved in fraternities and sororities over their time at Michigan.
- 43% expressed that "feeling on top of academics—confident that I can do the work required" was difficult for them during their Michigan experience.
- At the end of four years, 88% of students were certain that attending Michigan had been the right choice.
